As State Historic Preservation Officer, I am pleased to inform you that the property referred to above was entered in the National Register of Historic Places on the date indicated. A copy of the official notice and the National Register nomination are on file and available for your inspection at the New Hampshire State Historic Preservation Office, Prescott Park, Bldg. #2, 105 Loudon Road, Concord, New Hampshire.

The National Register is the official Federal listing of significant heritage resources (buildings, structures, sites, districts and objects) worthy of preservation, but it does not impose any restriction or limitation on the use of private or non-Federal property, unless Federal funds or programs are directly involved. Registered resources are eligible to be considered for Federal matching grants—in—aid for protection, preservation, rehabilitation or reuse. National Register designation also provides for review by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (a Federal agency) of potential effects which any Federally funded, assisted or licensed project might have on registered properties.

If a property is listed in the National Register, certain tax provisions may apply. The Tax Reform Act of 1976, as amended by the Revenue Act of 1978 and the Tax Treatment Extension Act of 1980, and the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981, contain provisions intended to encourage the preservation of depreciable historic structures by allowing favorable tax treatments for rehabilitation, and to discourage destruction of historic buildings by eliminating certain Federal tax provisions for demolition of historic structures. Beginning January 1, 1982, the Economic Recovery Tax Act replaces the rehabilitation tax incentives available under prior law with a 25% investment tax credit of certain historic commercial, industrial and residential rental buildings. This can be combined with a 15-year cost recovery period for the adjusted basis of the historic building. Historic buildings with certified rehabilitations receive additional tax savings because they are exempt from any requirement to reduce the basis of the building by the amount of credit. The Tax Treatment Extension Act of 1980 includes provisions regarding charitable contributions for conservation purposes of partial interests in historically important land areas or structures.
